What's Session Up To?

Every year the Session holds a retreat to ask big questions and to look at where we've been as a congregation, where we are currently, and to plan where we are going in the future. We always start with where we are. Back in July 2020, we adopted four goals (the big picture that guides our ministry), four priorities (specific things we are focused on right now that move us closer to our goals), and identified the core values that we want to be embodied in everything we do. Those goals, priorities, and values are always at the top of our Session agenda, so we don't lose sight of the work we believe God is calling us to at this time. We believe God calls us to be Christ to each other and the world, and the goals, especially the priorities, help us focus our efforts to do that without spreading ourselves too thin.

Every staff person and every committee or ministry team of the church also keeps these in front of them, as it guides our decisions, our actions, and our long-range planning. Every year the Session asks: Are these still the goals and priorities that we believe God is leading us to? So far the answer has been yes. This year, at our Session retreat, we began **Project Regeneration**, a program with the PCUSA Foundation, to help us with the process of asking that question. With Project Regeneration, a representative from the PCUSA Foundation will lead us in a collaborative, innovative process that involves reading, prayer, reflection, an in-depth look at our finances, and discernment, as we look strategically to the future.

The Session would be grateful if you could support us with your love and prayers as we embark upon this journey of introspection and seeking God's guidance for the growth of our congregation and our strategic direction for the future.

Goals & Priorities



What are the Goals and Priorities we've been focused on?

Our goals are big umbrellas:

- 1. Meet the real needs of people
- 2. Build a strong, inclusive church community
- 3. Be a church that looks on the inside like our neighborhood looks on the outside
- 4. Nurture a strong faith that changes lives

These are the work of the whole church – both committees/ministry teams, and each one of us as individuals. We also recognize that they are huge goals, so we focus our energy and resources on four specific priorities to move us closer toward those big goals. They guide us in what to say yes to, and what to say no to, in this specific time.

Our current priorities are:

- 1. **Connect with Our Neighborhood,** seeking effective ways to deepen relationships with our neighbors and partners, and grow new partnerships.
- 2. **Enhance a robust online ministry** that engages people in community far beyond our current membership. (It is a significant ministry to current members too!)
- 3. **Build a Strong and Comprehensive Pastoral Care Ministry** that reaches every member of the congregation, and addresses short-term, long-term, and emergency care needs.
- 4. **Design and Implement a Process that Welcomes and Integrates People** into our culture and the life of our church. The focus is integration and engagement, not just welcome.

These are never far from our minds as our staff, committees, ministry teams, and session meet and do our work. Each of these is important for a healthy, growing church. We created ministry teams to specifically work on the Online and Hospitality priorities (#2 and #4). We work with the Deacons and Stephen Ministry to further develop our pastoral care ministry (#3). Our Mission & Outreach Ministry Team is primarily focused on connecting with our neighborhood and building partnerships (#1). We have also designed specific staff to help in each of these areas: Pastor Sue works with #1 and #2, Kris works with #3, and Brian works with #4.

Do any of these ignite your passion? If so, join one of the teams working on these priorities!

I actually listen to my sermons. Yes, truth be told, a lot of the time my sermons speak to me more than I'd like! And our Lent sermons about stopping and breathing are doing that now. For two weeks in March, I did something unusual: I took in each of those two weeks a vacation day, and a make-up day off. This meant I was only in the office (other than Sunday) for two days each week, instead of four, one of which is filled up with writing a sermon. Midway through the first week, I realized that I probably needed to do this a long time ago! It wasn't about having extra time off, rather it forced me to really prioritize what I was going to focus on for those two weeks because there was no way I could do everything I usually do in four days in just two days. As I evaluated what I would do for those two weeks, I realized some things were important and needed to be done, but they were not important for me to do. So I was able to do some quick training and hand off some ongoing work to others. As I look to my renewal leave in July, I was going to have to do this anyway, so this gave me a head start, so, as I said in my sermon on March 12, I can focus instead on the MOST important things.

Sometimes we make excuses to continue doing the things we do, even though they aren't where our heart is, and they don't give us life. Sometimes we need external things to force us to make better decisions. What are some of the things you need to let go of, so you can focus on the most important thing? And are you clear on what that most important thing is? Hint – the most important thing according to Jesus is simply being fully present with another – that is the most powerful way we can show love, and God, after all, is LOVE!

Mission & Justice

Exciting Things Happening with Mission and Justice!

As part of our work in connecting with our neighborhood and building partnerships for ministry, we are focusing our work in six primary areas:

- 1. **El Centro de Las Americas:** Trey Andrews serves on their board and heard our desire to build partnerships, and reached out to us. We are excited about this new partnership and where it will lead us! April 14 we are sponsoring a table at their fundraiser Gala.
- 2. **Justice in Action:** Exciting things are happening, which will all be revealed at a Rally on March 30th at St. Mark's UMC on 84th and Pioneers. Show up at 6:30 pm and hear about the work we're doing narrow down the big issues of criminal justice reform and mental health, so we can actually make a difference. Then put Thursday, May 4 on your calendar even if you haven't been involved before, please show up then! We'll meet at the Lancaster County Event Center, and we hope to have at least 1,200 people present as we meet with city and county leaders to talk about making a difference.
- 3. **The Lighthouse:** Bill Michener is the executive director, and we are working with him to find more ways for us to volunteer there and make a difference. We'll also be sponsoring a table at their Fall Fundraiser.
- 4. **The Gathering Place:** We continue to support and volunteer at The Gathering Place. We provide volunteers to serve on the first Tuesdays of the month. If you're interested in volunteering, please contact Sherry Knapp or Carrie in the office.
- 5. **McPhee Elementary School:** This is one of our longest partnerships, and we continue to provide volunteers to help kids read, pack food for families at the 1st Friday Food Market, and host a summer event to send the kids off with books and fun things for the summer, as well as helping out with emergency needs and supporting the staff.
- 6. **OutNebraska:** This is another new partnership, as we reach out to those who have often been ostracized or discriminated against. Once again we will be sponsoring a booth at the Star City Pride Festival in June. (Hopefully it won't be nearly has hot as last year!)

We continue to support Clinic with a Heart and Lincoln Literacy, and doing some mission work in South Sudan. We always welcome anyone who wants to share in this ministry. In our Lent series this year, we will find out what it really costs to be so busy. Let us reconnect to an unhurried God.

The theme of this series draws on the need for self-care in order to continue our work of caring for others. It addresses the growing intensity and frenetic pace of life. The series will invite folks to practice making room, clearing out, slowing down, and prioritizing for the sake of holistic lives. "This holistic life involves living with the rhythms that allow us to thrive, finding a balance between work, play, rest, and reflection. Jesus calls his followers to more than just unbridled consumption or production. Rather, the Scriptures see our lives and bodies as gifts that should be nurtured." Sue's sermons have been touching on this and

will continue through Lent.

We encourage you to find a spot where you live to set up a Prayer chair and God Box. And find a time during the day when you can go to the chair for at least 10 minutes a day. If you made a God Box whenever worries pop up, you are invited to write your worries on bits of paper and put them in your God Box as a sign that you are letting go of that which you cannot control into the care of God. Replace the time spent worrying in your head with speaking the Serenity Prayer.
